Pastor's Corner

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Today, in the Gospel, we hear the all too familiar story of Jesus as the Good Shepherd. Like most people today, chances are you do not know any shepherds. For the first Christians, who were familiar with shepherds, the Good Shepherd was a favorite image to associate with Christ. In fact, the earliest Christian art depicts Christ as the Good Shepherd, not the crucified Savior. Often he was portrayed as a beardless youth. Surprisingly, the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd is still popular. In fact, early childhood education experts tell us that young children find the concept of a shepherd and his love for his sheep enchanting.

In the Old Testament, God was called a shepherd, and God's people the flock. For instance, in Psalm 23, the psalmist sings that the shepherd leads him to green pastures near refreshing waters. The shepherd guards him in right paths and protects him from evil. God says, "I myself will pasture my sheep; I myself will give them rest... The lost I will seek out, the strayed I will bring back, the injured I will bind up, the sick I will heal." (Ezekiel 34:15-16)

According to the Gospels, Jesus referred to Himself as a shepherd. He said, "My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me." A shepherd knows his sheep well. There is a personal relationship between Jesus and His followers. Jesus knows each of us by name. On the other hand, we respond to His voice and do not follow the voice of strangers who may lead us to harm. Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." Unlike a hired hand who flees to save his life, Jesus saved His flock from the wolf, even though it meant sacrificing His own life.

The parable Jesus told about the lost sheep is a story about Jesus' concern and care for us sinners. He is the loving shepherd who goes to great lengths to search for His lost sheep and when He finds it, carries it back on His shoulders rejoicing.

When Jesus gave Peter the responsibility of leading His Church, He again used shepherd imagery. He told Peter, "Feed my lambs... Tend my sheep... Feed my sheep."

Knowing about shepherds sheds light on the image of Jesus as shepherd. The shepherd uses a staff with a hook on the end to guide the sheep and pull back the stray. Today, Jesus guides His flock through bishops, who are known as *pastors*, the Latin for shepherds. Bishops carry staffs called crosiers. The shepherd has a rod to fend off wild animals that might harm the flock. Jesus saved us from evil.

Jesus restores our souls. Shepherds feed their flocks. Jesus feeds us with the excellent bread of the Eucharist and brings us to living waters: Baptism and the Holy Spirit.

The image of shepherds is that they are kind, loving, patient, strong, and self-sacrificing. They are a good image for Jesus. And sheep, who can be rather foolish creatures, are a good symbol for us!



GOOD SHEPHERD

Reflection on John 10:11-18

On this Good Shepherd Sunday, Jesus says, "I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. These also I must lead, and they will hear my voice, and there will be one flock, one shepherd." These words call to mind the Church's mission of ecumenical and interreligious dialogue, which St. John Paul II states "is part of the church's evangelizing mission (Redemptoris Missio, 56).

While Jesus calls for a unity, a oneness for His flock, the aims of these dialogues with other Christians and people of other faiths (or of no faith) usually fall within three objectives:

- 1. To help people of different religions to live together in peace and harmony, a task which is ever more urgent in a world becoming increasingly multicultural, multireligious, and secular;
- To work together in the service of humankind, knowing that the problems which our world and communities face are so great there is need for the efforts of all, together, to reach out to those who are in need; and
- To share spiritual values, a mutual witness to beliefs, and an exploration of the riches of our respective traditions, helping all to deepen their religious commitments, respond with greater sincerity to God's call, and walk together toward the truth.

SAINT FIDELIS OF SIGMARINGEN

Saint of the Day: April 24 Patron Saint of: Lawyers

If a poor man needed some clothing, Fidelis would often give the man the clothes right off his back. Complete generosity to others characterized this saint's life.

Born in 1577, Mark Rey became a lawyer who constantly upheld the causes of the poor and oppressed people. Nicknamed "the poor man's lawyer," Rey soon grew disgusted with the corruption and injustice he saw among his colleagues. He left his law career to become a priest. Fidelis was his religious name.

As a follower of Saint Francis of Assisi, Fidelis continued his devotion to the weak and needy. During a severe epidemic in a city where he was guardian of a friary, Fidelis cared for and cured many sick soldiers.

He was appointed head of a group of Capuchins sent to preach against the Calvinists and Zwinglians in Switzerland. Almost certain violence threatened. Those who observed the mission felt that success was more attributable to the prayer of Fidelis during the night than to his sermons and instructions.

He was accused of opposing the peasants' national aspirations for independence from Austria. While he was preaching at Seewis a gun was fired at him, but he escaped unharmed. A Protestant offered to shelter Fidelis, but he declined, saying his life was in God's hands. On the road back, he was set upon by a group of armed men and killed.

Fidelis was canonized in 1746. Fifteen years later he was recognized as a martyr.

Fidelis' constant prayer was that he be kept completely faithful to God and not give in to any lukewarmness or apathy. He was often heard to exclaim, "Woe to me if I should prove myself but a halfhearted soldier in the service of my thorncrowned Captain." His prayer against apathy, and his concern for the poor and weak make him a saint whose example is valuable today.
